HCQG MYSTERY QUILT 2023

It's time for a new challenge! This time we are doing a mystery quilt! Please join along!

INFORMATION -

The quilt is a free pattern that has been approved by the Executive Board. We will be creating the quilt in sections to create the mystery.

The quilt is an Advanced Beginner quilt, mainly because we will be working with some small parts, but if you cut with care and sew accurate quarter inch seams, I think beginners will be fine.

This Mystery Quilt will last 6 months. We will be cutting and sewing the different parts as we go. By September's newsletter you will know what the blocks will look like. Make sure you label your fabrics, so you won't get your different parts mixed up.

I'm going to be giving you instructions and fabric requirements on how to make a 64" x 84" but it can easily be made into an 87 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 87 $\frac{1}{2}$ " or bigger quilt by adding additional blocks and changing your border sizes.

The quilt can be scrappy, controlled scrappy or just controlled with a limited color palette. It is fat quarter friendly, so if you have a fat quarter bundle you've been wanting to cut into but didn't know how you were going to use it, this is the time.

FABRIC REQUIREMENTS -

Fabric A – 2 ½ yards White/Cream/Light tone on tone (background)

Fabric B – 1 ¼ yards Medium Value Fabric – Darker than Fabric A

Fabric C - 1/3-yard Accent Color #1 - Solid Color or reads as a solid

Accent Color needs to coordinate with all fabrics chosen.

Fabric D - 1/3-yard Accent Color #2 - Solid Color or reads as a solid

Accent Color needs to coordinate with all fabrics chosen.

Fabric E – 12.5" Light Neutral Value – contrast to all FQs, can be a small non-

directional fabric

Fabric F - Fat Qtrs

You can make 3 blocks from a fat quarter. So, you will need to chose if you want to use 18 FQ's - 1 for each block, 9 FQ's - 1 for 2 blocks, or 6 FQ's - 1 for 3 blocks. This will depend on how scrappy you want it to be. If you decide to use yardage instead of Fat Quarters the total yardage will be 1½ yards. NOTE: Most of the FQs will be used with Fabric A, BUT some will be used with Fabric B.

HCQG Mystery Quilt 2023 Con't

FIRST CLUE -

- From Fabric A Cut 10 strips 2 ½" x WOF. Subcut strips into 272 1 ½" x 2 ½" rectangles. Label 136 rectangles Block A-1 and the other 136 as Block A-2. Cut 1 strip 4" x WOF. Subcut strip into 10 4" squares and label them Block A-3.
- From Fabric C Cut 1 strip 4" x WOF. Subcut strip into 5 4" squares and label them Block A-3. From the remaining 4" strip subcut the strip into 2 1 ½" strips WOF (discard remaining 1"). Subcut your 2 strips into 28 1 ½" squares. Label your squares as Block A-1. Cut 4 strips 1 ½" x WOF. Subcut strips into 108 1 ½" squares and label them Block A-1. Total 1 ½" squares should be 136.
- From Fabric D Cut 1 strip 4" x WOF. Subcut strip into 5 4" squares and label them Block A-3. From the remaining 4" strip subcut the strip into 2 1½" strips WOF (discard remaining 1"). Subcut your 2 strips into 28 1½" squares. Label your squares as Block A-2. Cut 4 strips 1½" x WOF. Subcut strips into 108 1½" squares and label them Block A-2. Total 1½" squares should be 136.

SEWING -

From Block A-1 draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the Fabric C – $1\frac{1}{2}$ "x $1\frac{1}{2}$ " squares. Place the square, right sides together at a corner of Fabric A – $1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangle. Sew on the drawn line. Trim $\frac{1}{4}$ " away from the sewn line. Open and press to reveal corner triangle.



Put together 2 units as shown below for a total of 68 units



Label these units as A-1 and put aside until later.
