

### DOG AND CAT BEDS




Hello all,


### Squares on Point Quilt

Fabric Needed:

- •72 5" squares (2 Charm Packs)
- Fabric used for borders (optional)

### **Pre-Project Day**

- Sew 6 squares together to make a row.
- Make 12 sets of rows.
- Sew the rows together to make a 6 by 12 rectangle. (See figure below.)
  - Cutting instructions and assembling of quilt will be discussed and demonstrated at Project Day.

### FYI - Pre-cut Fabric sizes

Layer Cake 10" x 10" One Yard 36" x 45" Charm Pack 5" x 5" Fat Quarter 18" x 22" Fat Eighth 9" x 21" Mini Charms 2.5" x 2.5" Jelly Roll 2.5" x 42" (40-42 strips of fabric)



#### "Sisters" BOM- Block 3

"Churn Dash" Variation:

Barbara Brackman's Encyclopedia of Pieced Quilt Patterns lists 20 names for this block design. "Churn Dash," "Hole in the Barn Door," and "Monkey Wrench" are the names most commonly used. The design was popular as early as the 1920's. I added small triangles in the corners of the 12" block for interest.

Select a group (of 3) fabrics to work with. You might choose

a stripe, a medium print, and a dark tonal. You may add a light print for the center square as I did from the FREE box. HST = half square triangle RST= right sides together



**Cutting for the 12" block** – See cutting diagrams for 10" squares at the end of the instructions. From a 2 ½" wide strip of light background fabric, cut 8 2 ½" x 4 ½" rectangles. Also from light background fabric, cut 8 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  squares. From light background fabric **or** light print, cut 1 4 ½" square for the block center. From stripe fabric, cut 4 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 4  $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles. From medium print (lilac), cut  $44 \frac{1}{2}$ " squares. From dark print (green), cut 4 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  squares.

Sewing the 12" block – I used patriotic prints for this second example of "Churn Dash." Pair each of the 4 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 4  $\frac{1}{2}$ " light background rectangles with a 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 4  $\frac{1}{2}$ " stripe rectangle; sew together on one long side. Press seams toward the stripe fabric.




Make the triangle units for the corners of the block:

Each of the 4 units is made with 2 2 1/2" background squares, a 2 1/2" x 4 1/2" background rectangle, a 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  dark print square, and a 4  $\frac{1}{2}$  medium print square.




Draw diagonal lines on the wrong side of the 4 ½" medium print square and on the wrong side of one of the 2 ½" background squares.

Sew the 2 1/2" dark print square together with the unmarked 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" background square; press seam toward the background square. Then sew the  $2\frac{1}{2}$  x  $4\frac{1}{2}$  background rectangle to the 2 joined squares; press seam toward the background rectangle.




Lay the 4 ½" medium print square on top of the square/rectangle unit, RST. Orient the drawn line as shown. Sew on the drawn line. Trim away excess seam allowance. Press seam toward the large, medium print triangle.




Place medium print cut-off triangle in FREE box.

Lay the 2 ½" marked background square on top of the dark print square, RST. Orient the drawn line as shown. Sew on the drawn line. Trim away excess seam allowance. Press seam toward the light background triangle. *Make 4 units which each measure 4 ½" square.* 



**Block Assembly** – Referring to the photo, lay out the units for "Churn Dash." Assemble the row as a "Nine Patch" of 3 rows with 3 units each. Arrows indicate pressing direction. *The block measures 12 1/2" square.* 



**Cutting for the 6" block** – Note that the small triangles in the corner units are omitted. From a 1 ½" wide strip of light background fabric, cut 4 1 ½" x 2 ½" rectangles. Also from light background fabric, cut 2 3" squares; cut in half diagonally. From dark print (green), cut 2 3" squares; cut in half diagonally. From light background fabric or light print, cut 1 2 ½" square for block center. From stripe fabric, cut 4 1 ½" x 2 ½" rectangles. **Sewing the 6" block** – (*Refer to the photos in the instructions for sewing the 12" block.*) Pair each of the 4 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " light background rectangles with a 1  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " stripe rectangle; sew together on one long side. Press seams toward the stripe fabric.

Make 4 HSTs by sewing a dark print triangle together with a light background triangle. Press seams toward the dark print triangle. *Trim each of the 4 HSTs to measure 2 ½" square.* 

#### **Block Assembly**


Referring to the photo below of the 6" block, lay out the units for "Churn Dash." Assemble the row as a "Nine Patch" of 3 rows with 3 units each. The block measures 6  $\frac{1}{2}$ " square.




#### Cutting Diagrams for 10" squares – includes pieces for both 12" and 6" blocks

#### **"Sisters" BOM- Block** 4 Written by Abigail Dolinger

The "Aunt Dinah" quilt design was first published in the 1940s.

Using my imagination, "Aunt Dinah" could have been the maiden aunt who visited the farms of her siblings for several months in turn. Her joys were helping to preserve garden and orchard crops, sewing clothing for the children, reading stories, and hand piecing quilt patches by lamp light when chores were done for the day. I would be happy for Aunt Dinah to come visit me, wouldn't you?



Select a group (of 3) fabrics to work with: a large scale print for the block center, a medium

print for the large triangles, and a lighter tone-on-tone for small triangles and squares. **ToT** = tone-on-tone **RST**=right sides together

**Cutting for the 12" block** – See cutting diagrams for 10" squares at the end of the instructions.

From light background fabric, cut 2 5" squares; cut in half diagonally From light background fabric, cut 1 5  $\frac{1}{2}$ " square From light background fabric, cut 4 3" squares; cut in half diagonally From medium print (lilac), cut 2 5" squares; cut in half diagonally From light ToT fabric (yellow), cut 1 5  $\frac{1}{2}$ " square From light ToT fabric (yellow), cut 4 2  $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares From large scale print, cut 1 4  $\frac{1}{2}$ " square for the center of the block

#### Sewing the 12" block –

Make 4 quarter square triangle units:

Layer the 5  $\frac{1}{2}$ " light background square RST with the 5  $\frac{1}{2}$ " light ToT square.

Cut on both diagonals and then sew together along one short side. **Be sure to begin sewing at the 90 degree corner with the light background triangle uppermost.** Press seams toward the ToT triangle.


Sew a light background triangle (cut from  $5^{\prime\prime}$  squares) to the quarter square triangle units. Press seams toward the large background triangle. *Trim to measure 4 \frac{1}{2}^{\prime\prime} square.* 





#### Make 4 units for the block's corners:

Sew 2 background triangles (cut from 3" squares) to each 2 ½" light ToT square as shown. Use a triangle ruler to sliver-trim excess seam allowances of the hypotenuses.



Sew a medium print triangle (cut from 5" squares) to each of the square/triangle units. Press seams toward the medium triangles. *Trim to measure 4 1/2" square.* 

Block Assembly – Referring to the photo, lay out the units for "Aunt Dinah."

Assemble the row as a "Nine Patch" of 3 rows with 3 units each. The block measures 12 ½" square.



#### Cutting for the 6" block -

From light background fabric, cut 2 3" squares; cut in half diagonally From light background fabric, cut 1 3 ½" square From light background fabric, cut 4 2"squares; cut in half diagonally From medium print (lilac), cut 2 3" squares; cut in half diagonally From light ToT fabric (yellow) cut 1 3 ½" square From light ToT fabric (yellow), cut 4 1 ½" squares From large scale print, cut  $12 \frac{1}{2}$  square for the center of the block **Sewing the 6" block** – (Refer to the photos in the instructions for sewing the 12" block.)

Make 4 quarter square triangle units: Layer the 3  $\frac{1}{2}$ " light background square RST with the 3  $\frac{1}{2}$ " light ToT square.

Cut on both diagonals and then sew together along one short side. Be sure to begin sewing at the 90 degree corner with the light background triangle uppermost. Press seams toward the ToT triangle.



Sew a light background triangle (cut from 3" squares) to the quarter square triangle units. Press seams toward the large background triangle. *Trim to measure 2 \frac{1}{2}" square.* 

#### Make 4 units for the block's corners:

Sew 2 background triangles (cut from 2" squares) to each 1 ½" light ToT square. Use a triangle ruler to sliver-trim excess seam allowances of the hypotenuses.

Sew a medium print triangle (cut from 3" squares) to each of the square/triangle units. Press seams toward the medium triangles. *Trim to measure 2 \frac{1}{2}" square.* 


Block Assembly - Referring to the photo, lay out the units for "Aunt Dinah."


Assemble the row as a "Nine Patch" of 3 rows with 3 units each. *The block measures 6 ½" square.* 




#### Cutting Diagrams for 10" squares – includes pieces for both 12" and 6" blocks
